Dear members & friends of Trinity UMC,

Happy month of May! As May begins and we seem to finally be getting around to spring, we also begin a new season of worship together. Yes, the second Sunday of the month is Mother's Day and the 15th of the month is the high and holy day of Pentecost (the birthday of the Church when God gave the gift of his Spirit to empower us), and the 15th is also our IMAGINE NO MALARIA Sunday. 

Trinity welcomes Guest Speaker Paul Ohlrogge

Paul Ohlrogge grew up in Middleton WI and is the son of a Lutheran Minister. He has been involved in international work for 35 years. He chaired the malaria campaign effort in his small church called Vermont Lutheran near Black Earth, WI. The malaria project was hugely successful. He is married to Estela (from the Philippines) and has two adult Children – Ruth and Peder. They live on a small farm near Black Earth, WI.

Paul Ohlrogge is the Community Resource Development Agent for the University of Wisconsin Extension in Iowa County. Paul has worked with the University of Wisconsin Extension for 21 years. Paul was in the Peace Corps for 4 years and then followed with 6 more years in the Philippines working with the United Nations High Commission on Refugees – working with the resettlement of Vietnamese, Cambodian, Laotian and Hmong refugees. Paul has also worked on short term assignments in Rwanda, Cambodia, Uganda and Haiti. He is Board Member of the Wisconsin Micro-Finance Project. http://www.wisconsinmicrofinance.com/philippines/

GWEN'S PEN

Although Japan is known for its kites, no Japanese kite soared up to heaven like Dad's own hand-made brown paper creations. It was something he learned in Detroit, probably from his father. I can almost see him: a boy in a vacant lot running over dead grass, stones, and bits of broken concrete, looking over his shoulder at the kite as it caught the wind and began to put a tug on the string he held.

Our kites would fly from the compound yard in Tokyo, up and over the tall poplars, the two-story school building, the busy street and beyond as far as the string would allow.

But the genius began on the floor in the house where Dad gathered brown paper, two lightweight cross pieces he had whittled, string, scissors, and glue. Skillfully he formed a cross with his whittled pieces, tying them together firmly. Notching the four ends, he threaded string around the frame and fastened it securely. Next he carefully measured and cut a brown paper diamond slightly larger than the frame, glued the edges then covered the wood and string skeleton. When it was dry, Dad attached string partway between the center and the outside edge of each of the four slats, brought the ends together like a teepee frame and tied them to the single strand of kite string leading from the ball of cord wrapped elliptically around a smooth stick.

The kite was ready except for the tail. Mom supplied rags which we ripped into strips. Several lengths were tied together leaving extra rag strips to add weight to the tail if necessary. On this day the kite was launched just as Dad had launched his back in Detroit and we watched it catch the wind, turn a sudden somersault, and plunge to the ground. More tail. Launch

again. Again, it performed a frantic circle and plunged. More tail and launch again. When the balance proved right, the kite took flight. We gave it its head, letting out string from the big ball while holding tightly to the stick on which it was wound. Unsatisfied, the kite tugged, begging for release as it mounted yet higher until it reached the end of its tether ... no more string to let out.

My brother, Gaius, leaned backward balancing his weight against the strength of the wind. Then suddenly, with a jerk, the kite had its freedom. Kite string was no match for the wind that day. It carried the kite over the bustling, unheeding city of Tokyo. We watched it disappear, smiling as we imagined it out over the blue Pacific where, finally, after its adventure, it would have had to bow to the waning wind, drop from the sky, and give its magnificent self to the waves.

I am a kite my Heavenly Father made. How high will I fly? Jesus came so that I could have life, and have it abundantly.


