As August unfolds, we anticipate a time of renewal and relaxation. This is a season when church activities may slow down as many of our members spend cherished moments at cabins or embark on vacation trips. These moments of rest and rejuvenation prepare us for the upcoming resumption of church activities and the start of the school year in September.

Before we resume Sunday School and other church programs, my family and I are planning to take a renewal trip to Africa from August 15<sup>th</sup> to August 29<sup>th</sup>. We kindly request your prayers for a safe and enriching journey as we seek to strengthen our spirits and recharge our souls.

During this period, we are reminded of the importance of building bridges within our church community. Building bridges refers to fostering connections, understanding, and unity among our members and the broader community. It is about creating pathways that strengthen relationships, promote cooperation, and enhance our sense of belonging.

To this end, let us consider these essential types of bridges that we should aspire to build in our church:

- 1. <u>Relational Bridges</u>: Encourage open communication and active listening within the congregation, fostering a supportive and caring community. Remember what the book of Proverbs 18:13 says "If one gives answer before listening, it is foolishness and shame."
- 2. <u>Leadership Bridges</u>: Cultivate healthy relationships between church leaders and the congregation, demonstrating transparency, approachability, and humility as 1 Peter 5:2-3 says, "Be shepherds of God's flock that is under your care, watching over them, not because you must, but because you are willing, as God wants you to be not pursuing dishonest gain, but eager to serve; not lording it over those entrusted to you, but being examples to the flock."
- 3. <u>Generational Bridges</u>: Drawing inspiration from the wisdom of Psalm 22:6, "*Train children in the way they should go; when they grow old, they won't depart from it,*" we need to create opportunities for diverse generations to interact and learn together. Mentorship programs bridge the gap, where elders impart wisdom while the youth bring fresh perspectives and energy.
- 4. <u>Cultural Bridges</u>: Embrace and celebrate the diverse cultural backgrounds within our congregation, promoting unity amidst diversity. Revelation 7:9 says "After this I looked, and there before me was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, tribe, people and language, standing before the throne and before the Lamb. They were wearing white robes and were holding palm branches in their hands."

- 5. <u>Social Bridges</u>: Proverbs 14:31 advises, "Whoever oppresses the poor shows contempt for their Maker, but whoever is kind to the needy honors God." So, social bridges reach out to the marginalized and those facing challenges, addressing community needs with compassion and love.
- 6. <u>Interfaith Bridges</u>: Seek opportunities for collaboration with other faith communities, fostering mutual respect and understanding. Paul clearly recommend in Ephesians 4:3 "to make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace."
- 7. <u>Community Bridges</u>: Engage actively with the wider community, partnering with local organizations and participating in events that demonstrate our commitment to serve and support. Galatians 6:10 says, "Therefore, as we have opportunity, let us do good to all people, especially to those who belong to the family of believers."

By building these bridges, we can embody the true essence of being the body of Christ, united in purpose and love. It is a testament to the power of the Gospel in breaking down barriers and transforming lives.

As we continue this journey together, let us keep our eyes fixed on Jesus, the ultimate bridge-builder. Let His love and grace guide us as we reach out to one another and our community, fostering understanding, compassion, and unity.

May the peace of Christ, which surpasses all understanding, guard our hearts and minds as we serve together in love.

## How a Simple Shoebox Changes Lives

He was five years old living in extreme poverty in rural Mexico. His mom struggled to take care of him and his siblings since his dad was in prison (and would be in and out of jail most of his life).

Martin was doomed to follow in his father's footsteps and lead a life of drugs and crime. No one thought he would amount to anything other than "un delincuente" (a delinquent). No one invested in or cared about a little boy who would probably end up in juvi. No one gave him the time of day or thought he was worth the effort.



All that would change with a simple shoebox and a handwritten note. After being invited to a children's event, Martin received a gift that would forever alter his life and its course.

At this event, Martin received his first Operation Christmas Child shoebox. And while the toys and supplies inside were a blessing, the greatest impact came from a simple note that read, "God loves you and has a plan for your life."

Through the struggles and challenges of life, Martin always returned to that note and the promise that God was working all things together for good.

Even through his father's murder and his mother's heart attack (where her heart stopped for 2 minutes), Martin clung to the hope he had found as a child.

Now, Martin is 26 years old and was taken under the wing of a local pastor as a father figure. He is training to plant a church in an area that has none. His hope and desire is to impact lives through God's love just as his was transformed through a simple shoebox.

## A Simple Shoebox

It was through the gift of a simple shoebox that the trajectory of Martin's life changed. Martin needed love and guidance as do thousands of other kids around the world.

If you are unfamiliar with, Operation Christmas Child, it is a ministry of Samaritan's Purse that organizes a shoebox collection each Christmas season.

Families from all over the United States, Canada, and other countries are asked to fill shoeboxes with toys, personal care items, and school supplies. The ministry then delivers the shoeboxes to children all over the world all year long!

### **Provision Through a Shoebox**

Time after time I have heard story upon story of how a simple shoebox has not only permanently changed the life of a child but has met smaller needs as well.

One such story unfolded in one of the events we were blessed to attend.

An 8-year-old little boy opened his shoebox, and out of all the items in the box – the toys, the school supplies, etc. – he was most excited about a pair of socks.

Ivan later told us that his dad worked in a supermarket nearby and that he was going to go to work with him to earn money for socks because there was no money for new ones.

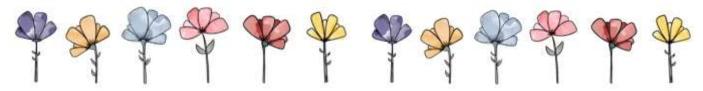
As he opened the box and saw the socks, his face lit up over such a small thing that many might often take for granted.

Ivan saw God's provision in a tangible way through a simple shoebox.



Finding ways to be more grateful and focus on the positive aspects of your life is a great way to improve your daily outlook. By creating the habit of gratitude through positive journal prompts, you'll build resilience and give yourself a chance to focus on the things you truly care about on a regular basis.

Noticing and appreciating the positive also reduces materialism, enhances generosity, and lowers stress and depression.



## **Gratitude Prompts**

- 1. Name a person you are thankful for that shaped who you are today.
- 2. What is something from each of your senses you are grateful for today? (Sight, smell, taste, touch, sound)
- 3. What challenge did you overcome that you now see the benefit in?
- 4. What book are you grateful for and why? What are the teachings?
- 5. What are you grateful for about your town? Your time period? Your country?
- 6. What are you most grateful for in your morning or night routine?
- 7. Name three everyday objects that you are grateful for.
- 8. What music are you most grateful for?
- 9. Name three unique things you are grateful for about 2023.
- 10. Name three people you are grateful for outside of your immediate family. Why?
- 11. What brings you gratitude with the passing of time? (Something you notice more than you used to.)
- 12. What do you love most about each season of the year?
- 13. What discovery have you made in the last year that you are thankful for?
- 14. What food did you eat today? Take a moment to share gratitude for the food and water that sustains you and imagine where it came from.
- 15. Do you have shelter? A warm place to sleep? Food on your table? Spend a few minutes being grateful for the necessities in life.
- 16. What did you do today that made you happy?
- 17. What aspect of nature did you appreciate in the last week?
