

Dear Trinity Family,

As November unfolds in Wisconsin, it brings with it the chilly winds and the vibrant tapestry of fall colors that remind us of the cycles of renewal and thanksgiving. This time of the year deepens our appreciation for warmth, not just in our homes but in our hearts through the community and fellowship that defines us. In these moments, as we witness the transformation of the world around us, we are reminded of the words from 2 Corinthians 4:16, "Therefore we do not lose heart. Though outwardly we are wasting away, yet inwardly we are being renewed day by day."

This month is marked by our much-anticipated annual Spaghetti Dinner on Thanksgiving Day here at Trinity Methodist Church. A heartfelt thank you goes out to all who are contributing their time and effort to prepare for this cherished event. Your dedication enriches our church family and extends our table to the wider community in a true spirit of gratitude.

We are also celebrating the successful launch of our First Contemporary Worship service, an initiative that could not have been realized without the tremendous support of our church family. We are currently raising funds to purchase musical equipment for our new Praise Band, as most of the equipment used at our first service was rented or borrowed. We need to raise \$6,000 and invite everyone to contribute as they feel led by the Holy Spirit. Please hand your contributions to Deb Zinniel. Your support will greatly improve our worship services and help make them a regular blessing.

Turning to a broader spiritual horizon, I am excited to share a brief report from the first Convening General Conference of the Global Methodist Church held in San Jose, Costa Rica.

I served as a pastor in the United Methodist Church for 25 years before joining the Global Methodist Church. During my tenure, I noticed a significant shift within the church—it began to function more like a corporate entity rather than a spiritual organization. This change deeply concerned me as the church seemed to lose its foundational spiritual dimension.

Unfortunately, this corporate mentality became prevalent among many members, pushing aside the guidance of the Holy Spirit. Instead of relying on faith and spiritual direction, there was a noticeable shift towards operational efficiency and organizational tactics and politics, overshadowing the church's true purpose. This transformation marked a departure from our core religious principles and responsibilities.

My expectations about church meetings have been shaped by my previous experiences, even though I try not to let them. Often, these meetings have been hurtful. Every General Conference I attended was filled with political maneuvering and tricky discussions, ending in decisions that made clear who won and who lost. The 2019 Wisconsin Annual Conference and the 2019 UMC General Conference were particularly tough. They left lasting wounds on many of us. From these events, I carried away a deep sense of hopelessness.

Since joining the Global Methodist Church and attending two annual conferences, along with the inaugural General Conference in San Jose, Costa Rica, I've experienced a profound renewal. This journey helped me reclaim a precious aspect of faith I felt was slipping away: "complete trust in God and letting the Holy Spirit direct our lives." These principles, revitalized during the conferences, are what I am eager to reintroduce to my local church community.

The Great Lakes Provisional Annual Conference (Our Conference) has been renamed the Great Lakes Annual Conference. Scott Pattison's role changed from President Pro Tem to Conference Superintendent. After thoughtful prayers and discussions, a plan was set to have bishops lead multiple annual conferences, not just one. This new system was approved, and six interim bishops were elected for two-year terms starting in November 2024.

The conference also witnessed the retirement of Rev. Keith Boyette, who significantly shaped the church's direction. His retirement led to Rev. Mike Schafer stepping in as the first Connectional Operations Officer.

The delegates also voted on the Global Methodist Church's new mission statement and introduce a vision statement. The new mission statement reads: "The Global Methodist Church exists to make disciples of Jesus Christ and spread scriptural holiness across the globe." The newly adopted vision statement declares: "Through the empowerment of the Holy Spirit, the Global Methodist Church envisions multiplying disciples of Jesus Christ throughout the earth who flourish in scriptural holiness as we worship passionately, love extravagantly, and witness boldly."

Looking ahead to 2026, the conference decided to host the next General Conference in a central African location, with plans to conduct some legislative work virtually before the General Conference. This change aims to streamline the process and make it more accessible. The exact location will be announced later.

The conference was deeply unifying because of its powerful worship. We knelt, cried, and sang passionately to honor God, experiencing a charismatic atmosphere. It wasn't just about speaking in tongues but feeling God's gifts fill our spirits as we focused on Jesus. This worship moved all the participants beyond themselves, preparing them to focus on God's work when they returned to their meetings.

In those moments, healing occurred. The worship, prayers, and communion served as ways God healed many wounds, some of which were kept open to avoid the pain of healing. The message was clear: it's time to forgive, stand tall, and embrace new life in Christ, leaving behind resentment and self-pity. Personally, I'm learning to let go of old grudges and accept God's grace, even when it's hard. This journey towards healing and forgiveness is something many of us share, as we learn new ways to relate and allow God to work within us.

Let us move forward with a renewed spirit of unity and purpose. Our collective efforts at these conferences and our local initiatives, like the Spaghetti Dinner, OCC program, Bible studies the Contemporary Worship service and many others, are all steps towards deepening our faith and strengthening our community. We are called to a life of service, forgiveness, and bold faith, living out the principles Christ taught us. As we commit to these actions, let us recall the words from Galatians 6:9, "Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up." This verse inspires us to persist in our good works and community efforts, trusting that our labor in the Lord is not in vain and will indeed bear fruit.





Trinity Shoebox Project Fund Status

Our church has seen a flurry of activity recently preparing for the Trinity Shoebox Project packing events. Pictured is the TEAM assembling 450 shoeboxes. Exciting times! Many thanks to those who have already offered financial support! The TEAM sure appreciates it and can't do what they do without your generosity.

Our project financial 'book' closes on 11/30. The funds received by that date are used to cover costs of purchased gifts and minimal admin expenses. The remaining balance is given to Samaritan's Purse for the suggested \$10 donation per shoebox that helps cover collection, processing, shipping, training, Gospel materials, and other project costs.

As of 10/27, the Shoebox Project fund is around \$2000 short of covering all expenses and the \$10 donation for 450 shoeboxes in full. Please consider a financial donation if you are able. What a great way to fulfill the Great Commission and be a Disciple of Jesus Christ through participation in Operation Christmas Child!

The TEAM continues to labor as God has directed our hearts without expectations. Please join us in praying that God will provide blessings within our church, our personal lives, and for the Trinity Shoebox Project.

The classroom was quiet as boys and girls opened their Operation Christmas Child shoeboxes. There were no squeals of excitement or chattering, no shouting for friends to come and look at the fun gifts inside their shoebox. Yet, their smiles were so big and bright that verbal expressions weren't needed to reveal the joy overflowing from their hearts. "It moved my soul seeing them very happy. It's like I got a gift for myself," said Klaudia, who teaches the group of deaf children in Opuwo, Namibia.

The Operation Christmas Child outreach event marked the first time that most of the children had ever received a present. Many of the boys and girls belong to the Himba ethnic group and come from families of livestock farmers who live in small mud huts in isolated villages.

Klaudia heard about the shoebox outreach events through Pastor Rizera and his regional team, who began reaching the Himba with the Gospel through Operation Christmas Child and The Greatest Journey about six years ago. Their efforts have resulted in several churches being started among the Himba, who previously had a longstanding tradition of worshipping ancestors and spirits.

Klaudia was excited for her students to participate in Operation Christmas Child because she wanted them to learn about the Gospel and to know that they are precious in God's sight.

"They felt loved today," she said. "They will be smiling the whole week."

A New Start

Klaudia's class is the only option for deaf children in Opuwo to receive an education unless they travel nearly 10 hours to the capital—which isn't an option for these impoverished families. None of the boys and girls in Klaudia's class had previously attended school or had an opportunity to learn sign language. Some students come to her as teenagers having spent their lives feeling alone because they were unable to communicate with family and friends. Klaudia isn't deaf and she doesn't have friends or family who are deaf. She had never thought about working with deaf children, but when God burdened her heart to reach out to this marginalized group, she knew she had to obey. Klaudia began learning sign language and pursuing a teaching degree.

"God called me to this. It's a pure love from my heart. The children make me smile, and they are my everything."

God is using Klaudia to show His love to children who have been abused and treated as outcasts. Deaf children in the Himba culture are often viewed as mentally disabled and unable to learn and function like hearing children. Sometimes they are seen as cursed or blamed for another's wrongdoing even when they are not at fault.

"People don't see that these deaf kids are like other kids. We are all human: there's no difference."

As much as Klaudia wants her students to learn the fundamentals of reading and writing, she is more concerned about their spiritual condition. She faithfully prays that her students will come to trust God and His love for them. "That started here, today, with the Operation Christmas Child shoeboxes," she said.

Receiving Christ as Saviour

Kavari is just one of many students who received a gift-filled shoebox earlier this year. Before joining Klaudia's class, he helped to tend his family's livestock. He had never been to school and had no hope of ever being able to do so.

Kavari had never met another deaf person until he started taking classes. He never got invited to play with children in his village because he was deaf. "Sometimes they beat me and bullied me," he said. But things are different now that he's in school. "I felt very happy and excited when I saw I'm not the only one who is deaf," he said. "Now, I can read and write. Life is better because of school."

Family and friends in Kavari's village have also had a change of heart. They see that he is not only capable of learning, but is thriving in school. "My family smiles every time I take my school papers to show them," Kavari said. Kavari was thrilled to see all the gifts packed inside of his Operation Christmas Child shoebox, especially the soccer ball. Yet, it wasn't a toy that excited him the most—it was The Greatest Gift storybook. In addition to hearing the Gospel before they receive their shoebox gift, boys and girls also receive this booklet that shares 11 Scripture stories and invites children to follow Christ.

Just one day after the outreach event, and Kavari was already eagerly sharing the stories in his book.

"I'm so happy to get the booklet. I learned about creation, how we should love one another, and how the kids in the Bible were excited to see God."

The stories in the booklet had quickly become more than stories to Kavari—he knew they were God's truth and that they would change his life. "I decided to follow Jesus," he said. Kavari said he is excited about going to church with Klaudia and sharing his faith with others.

"I want others to accept Jesus into their life."

Please pray for Klaudia, Kavari, and all of the students at the Opuwo school. Ask God to draw them closer to Him each day.
