



Dear Trinity Family,

Last week, I drove to Sheboygan through Batavia. Along the way, both sides of the road looked like a tall, green tunnel of corn. It was all I could see. It made me think about our farmers who work so hard. They till the land, plant the seeds, and care for the crops so that we can have food. I am very thankful for them, and I enjoy the sweet corn and juicy tomatoes that bless my table.

But the farmer can only do so much. He can plant the seed and water it. He can pull the weeds. But he cannot make the plant grow. Only God can do that. This is true for our food, and it is true for our faith. God is the source of all life, all growth, and all grace. The apostle Paul said it well: "I planted the seed, Apollos watered it, but God has been making it grow." (1 Corinthians 3:6)

September always reminds us that change is part of life. As August ends, the weather begins to shift. Days may still feel warm, but mornings and evenings start to cool. Temperatures swing from the seventies down into the fifties, and the nights stretch longer than the days. Soon the trees will paint the countryside with bright red, orange, and yellow. Corn will dry in the fields, and the green will fade away.

September also changes our daily lives. Children return to school, and the quiet roads now echo with school buses and ringing bells. Summer's free, unscheduled days are over, and new routines begin. Even our closets change, shorts and sandals are set aside, while long sleeves and light jackets take their place.

September also means new beginnings at our church. Sunday School reopens, choirs resume, and small groups gather again. As Kathy Drexler shares in her article, we will soon offer more adult learning opportunities. In November, Adult Sunday School will resume with a special focus on moving from membership to discipleship, helping us learn what it means to be disciples who make disciples.

Now, I know change is not always easy. At Trinity Methodist Church, we love our traditions. Traditions bring comfort because they are familiar. With them, we know what to expect. Change, however, feels uncertain and uncomfortable. It asks us to step into the unknown. Yet, when change fits the will of God, it brings discovery, excitement, and even joy. As Ecclesiastes says, "For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven" (Ecclesiastes 3:1). September itself is a living reminder that change is constant, and God uses each season for His purpose.

For us at Trinity, the greatest change we are called to embrace is moving from membership to discipleship. Being a member is important, but being a disciple of Jesus Christ is the deeper calling. Discipleship is about surrendering fully to Jesus, following His teaching, and making Him known in the world. As members of Trinity Methodist Church, we should ask ourselves: What attitudes and practices can we commit to in order to live as Christ's faithful disciples? How can we build up the Body of Christ and join in God's mission in our community?

Jesus says that discipleship is not just being part of the crowd but truly following Him with obedience, love, and a life that bears fruit. "This is to my Father's glory, that you bear much fruit, showing yourselves to be my disciples" (John 15:8). Moving from membership to discipleship means letting Christ shape our daily choices and then walking alongside others so they may grow in Him too. As Phil Maynard reminds us, "We need to make a shift from making members to making disciples" (Membership to Discipleship), not simply filling seats but fostering lives that live like Jesus and lead others to do the same. That's how we build faithful disciples who make disciples, and together, participate in God's Kingdom mission.

God uses Operation Christmas Child...

to touch the lives of Philippine children living in dire conditions. It smells so strongly of trash and cow dung at the big garbage dump outside of Manila that most people hold handkerchiefs to their noses to block some of the smell. No one wants to visit this area. Muck swallows shoes, leaving people barefoot in the smelly mess. And yet there are people who live

and work here. These people are lower-class Filipinos. They collect bottles and other pieces of trash to sell. Their houses sit right on the edge of the dump site and are made of trash. While most people crinkle their noses and want to leave, the dump people smile and laugh while the brown concoction on the ground squishes deeper in between their

toes. The children in this area are quiet but happy.

Today, the smiles are a little wider. On the walk home, the children cradle Operation Christmas Child shoeboxes underneath their elbows. This was a special day at school, a day of surprises. Although the teachers had tried to keep it a secret, the children had found out that they would receive gifts, and they were excited. Before she received her shoe box, 8-year-old Joy listed the things she wanted. "School supplies ... a pencil case ... a pencil ... anything that can be used for writing ... and shoes." She paused between each item as if she was afraid to say that she wanted more than one thing.



Nine-year-old Ralph slowly listed what he wanted, too. "School supplies, school bag, a T-shirt, shoes and socks." All of these are simple things that most American children take for granted. But in impoverished areas like this one, school supplies and basic clothing make a huge difference. "Education is the only way out," said Marlin, pastor of the church that arranged the shoe box distribution at the school. "OCC will make a difference for them." With new school supplies, the children will have more opportunities in class. But the shoe boxes don't just offer physical items to make life better for children. The gifts also present an opportunity to learn about the Gospel.

That's exactly what Ralph did. When he accepted his gift, he also accepted Christ. As he kicks a soccer ball to a friend, his smile isn't just because of his new toys. Now he has found God's love. Ralph and his friends were offered "The Greatest Gift of All" booklet with their gifts, which explains the story of Christ and salvation through Him. Ralph said he is excited to learn more about Jesus. Joy also received the booklet, but she didn't look at it as soon as she received it. She said she wanted to look at it later. When she reads "The Greatest Gift of All," there is hope that she too will find Christ's love.

At the end of the day, the smiling faces at the dump pick up their last bottles and throw them into bags. Then they walk the short distance to their houses. Children have finished playing soccer and are helping to prepare the evening meal. Over dinner, they will talk about their day at school. Parents will see every gift in the shoe boxes, and they, too, will hear about how Jesus loves them.



Stewardship and Finance Offering

In the past few months, I have started to read more. I started with a book that I never finished, which I received for Christmas (that I asked for) many years ago called the "The Purpose Driven Life — What on Earth am I Here for?" by Rick Warren. Then I was inspired by two of our young members of our Trintiy family, my son Justin and Nate Dewhurst. They both try to read their Bible regularly and I recently decided to do the same thing. I wish I could say I have always been a regular reader of the Bible, but unfortunately, I was not. I would read a chapter here and there, probably like most of us with good intentions but never stayed with it. On top of reading my book and the Bible, I also have a daily devotional given to me by someone very special several years back and never faithful read it either, so I started. "The Purpose Driven Life" talks about how important it is to do works of services and explains the different types there are. It says you need to find what fits your personality. I have been



feeling like my Chair position in the SF Committee was missing something. I felt like all I did was run meetings and help set the budget. I didn't feel that I was having any impact. I needed to do more with this position; I needed to serve somehow. I have prayed on it for several weeks and when reading my Bible, it came to me.

I have a couple of Bibles that I have obtained over the years but I choose to read my most recent copy the "New Living Translation". It has several sidenotes, cornerstones, and guides that help you understand, think, consider, and dive deeper than just the scripture itself. So, what I feel like God brought me to was this...to take the lessons from my readings and bring them to you as many times as I can in the newsletter. These will be mostly discipleship, stewardship, and finance related. The first ones are from the "New Living Translation – New Believer's Bible". The credit goes to them. Now let's begin...

First Steps: Give to God – Money is such an important topic in the Bible that it is the main subject of nearly half the parables Jesus told. In addition, one out of every seven verses in the New Testament deals with the topic. To give you an idea of how this compares with other topics, Scripture offers about five hundred verses on prayer and fewer than five hundred on faith, while there are more than two thousand verses on money! You may be wondering what money has to do with your faith. Now that Jesus Christ has come into your life, he wants, to be Lord (to be in command) of every aspect of it. That includes your finances. Martin Luther astutely observed, "There are three conversations necessary: the conversation of the heart, the mind, and the purse [or wallet]." When we experience this "conversion of the purse" and give freely of our finances to the Lord's work (to our church, a missionary, or a ministry), we will make the best investment possible-an investment with eternal dividends. With that in mind, we will explore five questions about wealth and giving in the coming months, till next time.






Fun Facts about Bill and Shari:
