Stewardship and Finance Offering

Hello Church Family, this month, we are going to look at the fourth of five questions on Giving to God from the 'New Living Translation – New Believer's Bible'. <u>How should you view material wealth?</u>

The answer: Accumulating wealth should never be a high priority because it is eternally worthless.

Matthew 6:19-34 - ¹⁹ "Don't store up treasures here on earth, where moths eat them and rust destroys them, and where thieves break in and steal. ²⁰ Store your treasures in heaven, where moths and rust cannot destroy, and thieves do not break in and steal. ²¹ Wherever your treasure is, there the desires of your heart will also be. ²² "Your eye is like a lamp that provides light for your body. When your eye is healthy, your whole body is filled with light. ²³ But when your eye is unhealthy, your whole body is filled with darkness. And if the light you think you have is actually darkness, how deep that darkness is! ²⁴ "No one can serve two masters. For you will hate one and love the other; you will be devoted to one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and be enslaved to money. ²⁵ "That is why I tell you not to worry about everyday life - whether you have enough food and drink, or



enough clothes to wear. Isn't life more than food, and your body more than clothing? ²⁶ Look at the birds. They don't plant or harvest or store food in barns, for your heavenly Father feeds them. And aren't you far more valuable to him than they are? ²⁷ Can all your worries add a single moment to your life? ²⁸ "And why worry about your clothing? Look at the lilies of the field and how they grow. They don't work or make their clothing, ²⁹ yet Solomon in all his glory was not dressed as beautifully as they are. ³⁰ And if God cares so wonderfully for wildflowers that are here today and thrown into the fire tomorrow, he will certainly



care for you. Why do you have so little faith? ³¹ "So don't worry about these things, saying, 'What will we eat? What will we drink? What will we wear?' ³² These things dominate the thoughts of unbelievers, but your heavenly Father already knows all your needs. ³³ Seek the Kingdom of God above all else, and live righteously, and he will give you everything you need. ³⁴ "So don't worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will bring its own worries. Today's trouble is enough for today.

This passage is part of Jesus' famous sermon on the Mount. <u>Here Jesus deals</u> with possibly the greatest distraction to following him wholeheartedly: wealth. This series of verses gives us at least three warnings about wealth and one prescription to overcome its enslaving effects:

We must watch how and what we store. Verse 19 says that we should not "store up treasures." The idea here is not simply saving, but stockpiling. Jesus is not condemning saving your resources or providing for your family (see Proverbs 6:6, and 1 Timothy 5:8). He is condemning the accumulative possessions to flaunt or to impress others. We need to be able to enjoy what God has given us without making those possessions our primary ambition.

We must keep our vision clear. While we can enjoy what God gives us, we need to understand that the material things of this world are only temporary. Our personal possessions and investments can be devalued by inflation or deflation, destroyed by natural disasters, or stolen by thieves. That is the problem with making the accumulation of "things" your life's passion. It is so fleeting, temporary, unfulfilling, and even enslaving. When we don't have this perspective, we can become easily enslaved to consumption and accumulation. Then we are no longer serving God but money, and our vision is dark, shutting out the light of God's Word.



We should not worry about material things. Worry is a powerful force that can divide or distract us. You can worry about your future, your job, your health, or even about what others think of you. But Jesus tells you to STOP worrying, because God will <u>always</u> meet your needs. Quite simply, <u>worry is a waste of your valuable time as his servant on earth.</u>

We must put God first in our lives. Our main concern should not be the acquiring of material possessions or prestige. Our primary pursuit should be seeking the reign of Jesus Christ in our lives above all else. It makes a lot of sense to place your temporary needs and worries in the hand of an eternal God. This lesson reminds me of the sermon given to us this past summer by Pastor Esther Somp from Luke 12:16-21. This is the story Jesus told about the 'rich fool', who had so much he decided to tear down his barns and build bigger ones to store up all he had. In verse 20 and 21 it says — ²⁰ "But God said to him, 'You fool!' You, will die this very night. Then who will get it all?' ²¹ "Yes, a person is a fool to store up earthly wealth but not have a rich relationship with God." If you continue reading in the book of Luke 12:22-34 it reads much like our sermon lesson in Matthew

from above. I encourage you to open your Bibles and read this passage in Luke (it will take only a few minutes). It must be a very important lesson that God wants us to learn if Jesus preached it, in depth twice. Around 15% of Jesus's words and 11 of his 39 parables focused on money and possessions, indicating its importance for us to understand this teaching fully. There are so many others around us that need assistance and all of our missions in our church. It would be wonderful if all our mission groups at Trinity had enough financial support to go above and beyond. Think of the amount of people we could reach and impact their lives through Jesus Christ, with the appropriate amount of support. Think of all the people we could help through our Trinity mission groups, especially in our local communities. The places we could go and the things we could accomplish. When you give to Trinity you are helping these causes and these missions accomplish their goals (Men's and Women's group, Caring, Youth, Music, OCC, FMSC). I ask you to pray on this message and give your lives fully to God. God is good all the time, and all the time, God is good.










"What a Par-Tea!"

Minutes of the December 9, 2025, Trinity Charge Conference Meeting - submitted by Deb Z

Meeting was called to order by Presiding Elder Karin Kaye at 2:30 pm. Karin then led us in opening prayer and the hymn "What a Friend We Have in Jesus". Karin commented on what an organized and nice packet Jill had prepared.

Reports:

Pastor's Report: Pastor Mulongo stated he had several pages in the pamphlet but gave a brief synopsis of his joys of attendance growth (Karin stated Trinity has the 3rd largest membership of the district), community activities including Spaghetti Dinner and Thanksgiving meal, the church property improvements, the increase in group participation like Adult Bible Study and Children's Sunday School. Karin commented that the ratio of members to the number of Operation Christmas Child shoeboxes exceeded many larger churches. She has heard the Trinity shoeboxes are very well packed. Pastor also mentioned his Thursday sermon previews and Facebook updates are well read and that he feels his mission trip to Cuba helped him grow spiritually.

Membership Report: Debra Zinniel reported that the 14 people listed either passed away or requested to be removed from membership. Karin stated there is no policy or guideline to remove people from membership in the GMC at this time. Debra stated Trinity's procedure includes several phone calls and letter prior to removing someone.

Trustees Report: Karin mentioned she was happy to see we have a child protection policy in place. There is a program called Ministry Safe that we could investigate. Karin likes the improvements to the parking lot and steeple as they look more inviting to people.

Finance Report: Annual Audit was mentioned but Karin was assured we are audited every year. Deb Bintzler-Oestreich mentioned that the Missions Team hosted a September 20th luncheon for people over 80 years old. Everyone looked at the 2026 Budget including Pastoral Compensation and Housing Allowance. A motion was made by Augie Luedtke to pass the Budget and seconded by Doug Kiehnau and thus approved.

Nominations and Leadership Development: It was brought up that Clarice Drummond was appointed as an Alternate Lay Delegate to Annual Conference. The 2026 Church Leadership personnel report was reviewed by everyone in attendance. A motion was made by Bill Buske to approve it and seconded by Doug Kiehnau.

Endorsements: There are no new or renewed Ministerial Candidates or Certified Lay Ministers to report.

Augie Luedtke reported he has 2 new grandchildren; Kathy Drexler stated we are blessed with a Caring Ministry that visits shut-ins and nursing home residents; Deb Bintzler-Oestreich said the Men's Group pays for and arranges transportation for those wanting a ride to church. Debbie is also thankful for our church as it is how she and Lee developed their relationship. Bill Buske is thankful for Shari's recovery. Doug Kiehnau is looking forward to working with the Toys for Tots program. Pastor is blessed with a new granddaughter; Clarice is pleased that all the church ministries are doing well; and Karen is thankful that all her family was able to spend Thanksgiving together.




