Dear friends and siblings in Christ,

Spring in Lomira: one day you need a jacket, the next day you need sunscreen. But this year, instead of talking about the changing weather, I want to talk about something much more important, our spiritual growth.

From May 10 through September 13, many of our church activities will pause. Meetings will slow down. Programs will take a break. But here is the truth I want to leave with you today: our walk with God is not meant to pause.

In fact, this summer can become a season of renewal—not only because of what we do at church, but **because of what we do at home. Long before there were church buildings, God’s people worshiped Him in their homes, teaching their children, praying together, and trusting Him in daily life.**

The Bible reminds us in Joshua 24:15, *“As for me and my house, we will serve the Lord.”*

So, as we enter this summer season, I encourage each of you to focus on simple and faithful practices at home. Family worship does not need to be long or complicated. It can be as simple as:

- Praying together for a few minutes each day
- Reading one short Bible verse as a family
- Thanking God before meals
- Parents and grandparents blessing their children and reminding them that God loves them

These small moments can make a big difference in our spiritual lives. Let us also remain faithful in gathering for Sunday worship whenever we are able. Even as activities pause, our time together in worship continues to strengthen and encourage us.

Before our summer pause begins, we have a special blessing: Vacation Bible School on May 1 and May 2. This is a special time for learning, joy, and planting seeds of faith in young hearts. Let us keep our children, volunteers, and the Sunday school leaders in our prayers.

Speaking of our summer pause, we will need musicians to offer special music every Sunday from May 10 through September 13. If you sing or play an instrument, please sign up to share your gift with us.

Along with these practical needs, we also have several important celebrations in May. On May 10, we celebrate **Mother’s Day, giving thanks for the love and care of mothers and all who nurture us in faith.** On May 17, we remember the Ascension of our Lord, when Jesus was taken up into heaven as we read in Acts of the Apostles 1:9. This reminds us that Christ reigns over all things, including our homes and daily lives. Then on May 24, we celebrate Pentecost, the birthday of the Church, when the Holy Spirit came upon the disciples. As it is written in Acts of the Apostles 2:4, *“All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit.”* The same Holy Spirit is with us today, guiding us and helping us grow in faith, both in church and at home.

Let me also give you a quick update on our Adult Sunday School. We have completed our study of *Membership to Discipleship* by Phil Maynard. We will take a break for the summer and return on September 20 with a new study using *The Visual Bible: Acts*. We will watch the Book of Acts, word-for-word, and place ourselves in the story. We will learn how the Holy Spirit worked in the early church and how God is still at work in us today. We will study one chapter over two Sundays, giving us time to watch, think, and share together.

Before I share the scriptures and sermon titles for this month, I want to thank God for His faithfulness through every season. We are especially grateful for the beautiful Confirmation Sunday we celebrated on the last Sunday of April. The theme, *"Your Journey Continues,"* is not only for the confirmands, but also for all of us. Our journey with Christ does not stop. Each day, we are called to keep growing, keep trusting, and keep walking with Him.

Here are the scriptures and sermon titles for May:

May 3 – John 14:1–14, *"Greater Works Than These"*

May 10 – Proverbs 31:25–31, *"Qualified for the Impossible"*

May 17 – Guest Speaker (Vacation Sunday)

May 24 – Joel 2:28–29; Acts of the Apostles 2:1–4, *"Pour It Out Again, Lord"*

May 31 – Matthew 28:16–20, *"From Worship to the World"*

Finally, let me leave you with this important truth. The newness of life all Christians should look for is found in the forgiveness Jesus offers. As we enter May, let us be proactive in living out the words we pray every Sunday: *"Forgive our sins as we forgive those who sin against us."* These are not just words we say, they are words we are called to live. When we forgive, God renews our hearts, restores our relationships, and draws us closer to Him and to one another. *"Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: The old has gone, the new is here!"*— 2 Corinthians 5:17

May this month of May be a time of renewal for you and your family. Let every home become a place of prayer. Let every family become a place where God's Word is heard and lived. And let each of us walk daily with the Lord, trusting Him in every moment.

Stewardship and Finance Offering

Hello Church Family,

I would like to start this month by giving you some updates on the current health of our church's finances. To date this year, we have received 2 separate donations of \$10,000 each. One was given by the Brasch family to go towards the parking lot and the other was given anonymously and specified to help cover the final costs of the new sanctuary speakers. Only the parking lot donation counts towards budget though, so as of April 19th we are currently in the black with a positive \$5,201 balance towards the budget. We are using the balance of the Bill Seefeldt monies that we still have, along with the extra donation to cover the costs of new speakers and mics (being installed in May of this year).

So far, this year we are on average receiving contributions from 34 members each week with an average of \$5,393 received each week. Last year at this same time we had 29 members giving an average of \$3,725 a week. What a wonderful blessing to see we are up 5 members given weekly. The parking lot fund has received \$16,380 this year and \$18,748 last year for a total of \$35,128 received to help pay off the line of credit we have for this.



The trustees are looking into painting the sanctuary this year and using the ERC money our church received last year to cover this expense. The trustees have been working cleaning up and taking down trees around the property with the donation provided to them (\$20,000 each year for the next 5 years) to be used for exterior grounds projects. We have also received estimates to clean and polish the floors in the church. This project is under review at this time with the Church Council, to determine if funds are available this year to cover the costs.



I would like to speak to you this month about one of God's promises. We learn about this promise in Hebrews 13:5 - *Keep your lives free from the love of money and be content with what you have, because God has said "Never will I leave you, never will I forsake you."* What we have to remember is that God is not saying money is bad or evil, there are plenty of stories of good people in the Bible and the world that have lots of money. The important part is the 'Love of Money', when money means more to you than God. The problem is, when you love money and having more and more, it can lead our lives astray from God. It takes our focus from Him and the promise God provides us. This is what the author of Hebrews is talking about, being so caught up in having

money and only thinking about how to get more, so that you can buy more. It reminds me of a song by my favorite country group Diamond Rio – "Stuff". When you have time look it and take a listen. There is a part in the song that sings "*Never gonna ever get enough, STUFF, Oh it's treasure till it's mine, then it ain't worth a dime, it's STUFF.*" When money talks it only says one thing "you don't have enough" no matter how much you have, never will it be enough. When we get in those moments in life of wanting more "stuff" remember the words of the Apostle Paul in 2 Corinthians 6:10 – *Our hearts ache, but we always have joy. We are poor, but we give spiritual riches to others. **We own nothing, and yet we have everything.*** With God we have everything we will ever need. Remember this, it is ok to have stuff and money, but what's important is being content without it. What God is getting at is if you continually think that the stuff will make you happier...that's the 'Love of Money'. Eventually, that feeling wears off once you get it, it's like the Diamond Rio song says, "it ain't worth a dime" and then you need the next thing, the next car, house, outfit, phone, job, and it goes on and on. Be content with what God has provided you because of His promise "*Never will I leave you; never will I forsake you.*" God didn't just say it once He said it twice, I think he wants us to really feel His assurance in this message. No matter how much money we have remember God is there for us, put your full Faith in God. I ask you to pray on this message and give your lives fully to God. God is good all the time, and all the time, God is good.

- Confirmation is really the beginning in taking ownership in your faith

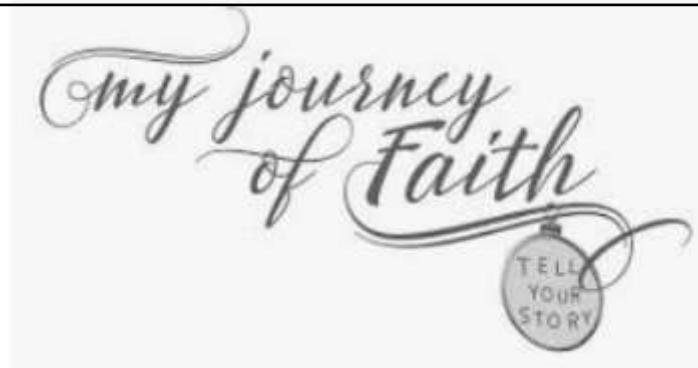


Tristin -

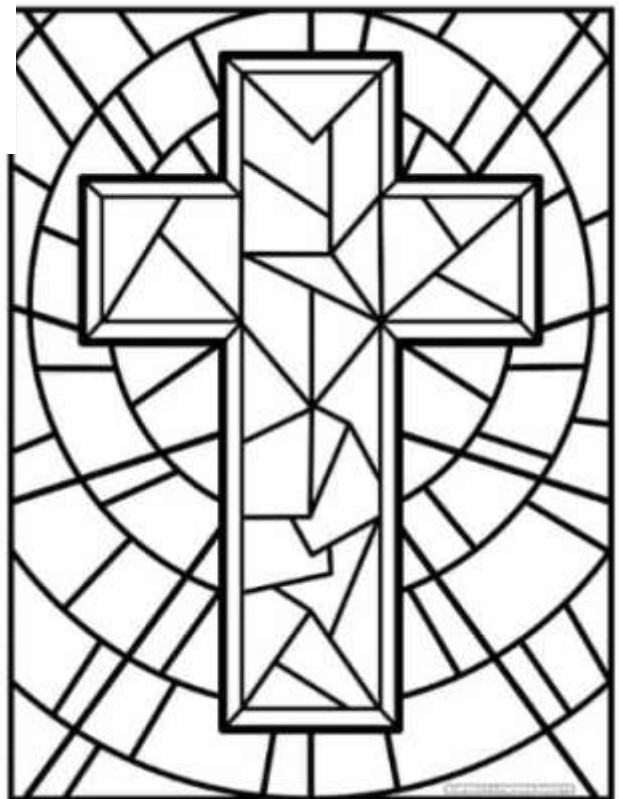

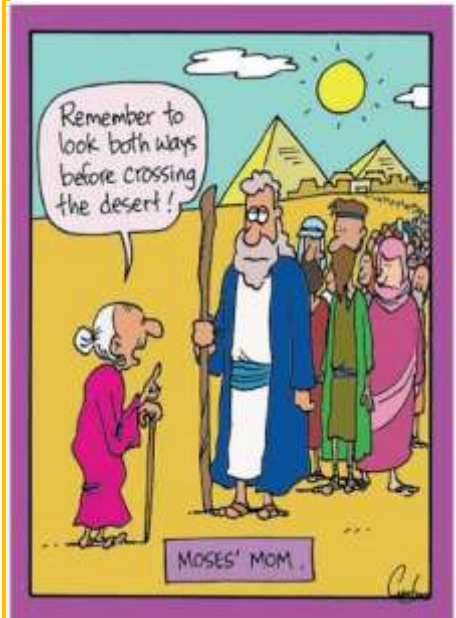

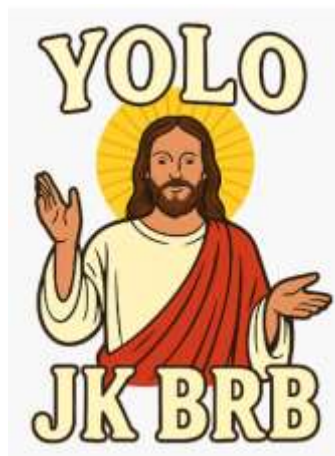
